ANG.05277.02	<p>Vertiefungsmodul Sprachwissenschaft I - English Word-Formation</p> <p>Course outline: This seminar will be devoted to a critical investigation of word structure in English. First, we shall take a look at the morphological building blocks of English and review (or introduce) basic concepts such as word, word-form, (allo-)morph and lexeme. We then move on to contrasting inflectional morphology from derivational morphology, or, in other words, word-formation. This will be embedded in a discussion of the more general issues of lexicalization and productivity, involving such questions as: How do new words come into being? Are there any constraints? Why are some formations successful and others not? How can the productivity of word-formation processes be measured? This section will be followed by a study of the major processes that are involved in the formation of (complex) new lexemes in English, such as affixation, compounding, conversion, backformation, clipping, blending, acronymy and eponymy.
